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

NIKPA AGM

On Sunday, June 17th the NIKPA AGM took place at the Ramada Hotel in Shawsbridge. There was an excellent turnout. The meeting was also attended by NIKPA President Dr. Ciaran Doherty, Consultant Nephrologist at Belfast City Hospital.

A very interesting talk was given by Mr Michael Connolly on NIKPA's desire to set up patient-run focus groups at each of the dialysis sites throughout Northern Ireland. The idea being that Local Focus Groups would concentrate on local issues while, NIKPA being an umbrella group, would concentrate on supporting the focus groups and representing the wider issues of kidney patients in the region. If you have a local group or want to set-up a focus group NIKPA want's to help you and would ask that you get in touch with us.

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What do kidney patients want and need?

The patient's view of how to improve their health and quality of life.

My partner Neill and I, along with Peter and Margaret Mc Keown, attended the above event which was organised by Dr Faieza Qasim, FRCP, PHD, Consultant Nephrologist, colleagues and patients from Manchester. This was supported by BTS and UKT and financially by a grant from The Astellas Foundation all of which I would like to thank for their generous support for this event.

The day started with a welcome from Dr Faieza Qasim who thanked everyone for attending, then introduced Professor Steve Powis, Professor of Nephrology, Royal Free Hospital, London, who gave a very interesting and informative talk on transplantation, past present and the future. There was a slide show which started from the very beginning, the first twins in America to be transplanted up until the present with different graphs showing how the success rate has risen, the latest research in renal medicine. Then we had some patients give a talk on their experiences of transplantation, (the good, the bad and the ugly) One patient talked about a live donor kidney from a family member, how they found it all quite emotional. Another talked about transplanted their kidney rejecting and having to go back on dialysis - then receiving another kidney - and the worry it will happen again.

After the morning break we were then split up into four different workshop groups, comprising of three for transplant recipients and one group for carers, partners and family (which I thought was a very good idea). There was a spokesperson for each group who took notes of what was going on. The main topic in my group was the emotional side of having a transplant. Getting a normal life back again after being so low on dialysis. For some, maybe losing your confidence, also the other health problems we can endure after transplantation.

After lunch we went to look at the different stands on display; Transplant Games, Exercise, Diet, Drugs, Donors, UKT, NKF, tissue typing and Nowgen-Pharmacogenetics. Then we had feedback from all of the four workshops. Some issues raised were as follows; counselling - is there always someone there to talk to, income - being able to go back to full time work, communication - especially for the elderly, have they got family? Someone with them to help understand their medication, results, also for patients to keep a record of their own results and when medication changes. A panel was then set up consisting mainly of Renal Associated Medics and Services from Manchester along with Professor Steve Powis, Royal Free Hospital, London to answer any questions from the floor.

I hope to receive an update from Dr Faieza Qasim, I will send this on as soon as I receive it, it was almost too much to remember or note all the material that was covered on the day.

They are hoping to run this event again next year with a view to a different location, possibly going through the local Kidney Patient's Association to nominate people to go. I would be quite willing to help out where possible or provide any information.
