ST COLUMBA PEACE AND NEW LIFE GARDEN

The official opening of St. Columba's Peace and New Life Garden took place on Sunday 27 Oct 2013. This garden of New Life gives thanks to all organ donors. Present at the opening were the Mayor and representatives of Derry City Council, as well as representatives of St Columba's Cathedral, St Columba's Church, First Derry Presbyterian Church, Northern Ireland Kidney Patients Association and the Circle of Life Garden in Galway. The Fountain and Bogside communities were also represented along with residents of Alexander House.

The Fountain and Bogside communities established the St Columba's Peace garden in 2003 on the interface between the two communities. It was thought appropriate to integrate the New Life gar-

thought appropriate to integrate the New Life garden with St Columba's Peace garden to create what now will be known as St Columba's Peace and New Life Garden.



Those people who have been lucky enough to receive a transplant have described the organ donation process as the equivalent of receiving a new life. This gift of a new life is only made possible by the self-less generosity of organ donors. Donors can quite often be the forgotten partners of this gift of life even though without donors there would be no new life. All donors have demonstrated, through organ donation, incredible courage and humanity in providing the means for saving the lives of those less fortunate. To recognize the tremendous generosity of donors and their relatives, Altnagelvin Renal Support Group supported by Derry City Council created a New Life Garden. The garden is a small token of the appreciation that is felt for all donors and, as organ donation knows no boundaries, so St Columba's Peace and New Life Garden will become a place of peace and reflection for all in our community.

There are similar Life gardens in Kiltonga in Newtownards and Salthill in Galway and The Altnagelvin Renal Support Group have established links with the organizers of these gardens and hope to partake in combined events to promote further awareness of Organ Donation

The St Columba's Peace and New Life Garden is situated in Bishop Street adjacent to Bishops Gate, opposite Alexander House and everyone is encouraged to visit.

Funding to Examine Quality of Life

Dr Helen Noble (right), lecturer at Queens University Belfast has been awarded a three-year National Institute of Health Research (NIHR) Post Doctoral Fellowship. The award of £512,000 will be used to examine quality of life, decision making and costs in people with advanced chronic kidney disease who have opted to receive conservative kidney management rather than dialysis. One of her mentors during the Fellowship is Professor Peter Maxwell, Consultant Nephrologist at the Belfast City Hospital Trust.



People who make the decision not to have dialysis will be followed three-monthly over one year and data collected on their quality of life, the decision they have made and the costs of treatment. Costs to carers and quality of life will also be studied. The study will help inform the decision making process, between patients, carers and staff, for and against dialysis and aims to improve clinical outcomes and care giver experience. This study builds on previous work carried out by Dr Noble which explored the experiences and trajectories to death of patients with advanced chronic kidney disease managed without dialysis cared for in a Renal Supportive Care Service at a London Hospital Trust.

Dr Noble trained as a renal nurse at Charing Cross Hospital, London and worked as a renal Ward Manager and Matron at The Royal London Hospital, London for many years. She came to work in Belfast three years ago. She has a range of experiences of caring for people with renal disease both in the hospital, community and University setting. She is a member of the Northern Ireland Kidney Patient Association who she worked with in developing the successful research proposal submitted to NIHR.

Transplantation in 2013

This has been a record year in renal transplantation for Northern Ireland, both numerically and in terms of the type of kidney transplants performed. In total, 102 patients received a kidney transplant, of which 94 took place in Belfast. This represents an increase of over 100% from previous levels (between 1999 and 2008 there was an average of 43 transplants annually).

Three of the patients received a combined kidney and pancreas transplant in Edinburgh, one baby was transplanted in Manchester (from his mum) due to special difficulties in his case, and four patients had their live donor transplant in London due to the very high risk of rejection which that particular centre has expertise in managing.

Clearly, the time of transplantation is challenging physically, mentally and emotionally for patients and their families, and having to be away from home at this time, for many reasons, makes this additionally stressful. For the first time we have been able to offer transplantation between a live pair that have been the 'wrong' blood group (termed blood group, or ABO, incompatible transplantation). Previously such patients either were unable to donate or had to travel to London to do so. Since October, four such operations have been successfully carried out in Belfast.

The live donor programme continues to exceed expectations, with 53 being performed in Belfast and five elsewhere. Overall, our live donor rate is over twice the national average (33 v. 16 donors per million population). This has been sustained at this level for over three years which is a reflection on the phenomenal generosity and altruism of people here.

The number of deceased donors was significantly increased compared to recent years due to a combination of factors. Additionally, we have been able to use donors where it is essential that the time before the transplant takes place is very short (donation after cardiac death donors); these have been used in other centres for some time and we are pleased that patients in Northern Ireland will now have opportunity to benefit from such kidneys also.

Finally we have undertaken a lot of work with our colleagues in the tissue typing laboratory, which has enabled us to transplant a considerable number of patients who had been waiting for a very long period of time. Of the 30 patients active on the transplant waiting list in January 2013 who had been waiting the longest, 22 have since been transplanted.

We are not complacent however, and will continue to strive to improve the transplant service so that even more can benefit from the gift of life in 2014.

Winter Warming Renal Recipes

Thanks to Kareena Magee, renal dietician with the Belfast Trust we would like to pass on the following recipes for you to try. Bon appétit!

Ginger sponge pudding

Preparation time: less than 30 mins

Cooking time: less than 10 mins, Serves 2

Ingredients:

55g/2oz self-raising flour

55g/2oz unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing

55g/2oz caster sugar

- 1 tbsp milk
- 1 tbsp clear honey
- 2.5cm/1in piece root ginger, peeled and finely grated
- 1 free-range egg

For the lemon syrup

50g caster sugar 45ml lemon juice

Preparation method

Lightly grease a small microwave-proof bowl.

Place all the ingredients except the egg into a food processor (or use a hand held mixer) and blend to combine. Crack in the egg and pulse briefly to mix.

Pour the mixture into the prepared bowl, lightly place some cling film over top of the bowl, so it's not touching the sponge mixture. Microwave on high for approximately 4 minutes or until the pudding is

cooked. Make your lemon syrup by heating the sugar and lemon juice in a pan until the sugar has dissolved. Turn the pudding out onto a plate. While your cake is still warm, make lots of little holes in the top with a cocktail stick and pour your syrup over.

To serve, turn the pudding out onto a plate. Serve in bowls with whipped cream if preferred.

Analysis per serving of pudding: 667Kcals, 6.2g Protein, 6.3mmols Na,

4.2mmols K+, 6.1mmols Po4

Crunchy Garlic Chicken

Serves 2

Ingredients:

- · 1 clove of garlic
- 1 lemon
- 6 cream crackers
- 25g unsalted butter
- 4 sprigs of fresh flat leaf parsley
- Fresh ground black pepper
- 2 heaped tablespoons plain flour
- 1 large egg
- 2 skinless chicken breasts

Preparation method

Preheat the oven to its highest temperature. Peel the garlic and zest the lemon. Put your crackers into a food processor with the butter, garlic, parsley sprigs, lemon zest and a pinch of pepper. Whiz until the mixture is very fine, then pour these crumbs on to a plate. Sprinkle the flour on to a second plate. Crack the egg into a small bowl and beat with a fork. Lightly score the underside of the chicken breasts. Put a square of cling film over each one and bash a few times with a rolling pin until the chicken breasts flatten out a bit. Dip the chicken into the flour until both sides are completely coated, then dip into the egg and finally into the flavoured crumbs. Push the crumbs on to the chicken breasts so they stick- you want the chicken to be totally coated. Place the chicken on a baking tray and cook for 15 minutes. Cut the chicken into strips and pile them on a plate.

Serve with a small side salad and the lemon wedge.

Analysis per serving of crunchy chicken: 624kcals, 4.4mmols K+, 4mmols Po4, 7.2mmols Na.
